This group of Mr. Bufalini, Mr. Kusnir, Mr. DiPietro, Mr. Ciccone and Mr. Swihart look forward to working with all Hopewell Township residents in 2017 to ensure the best interests of the township always come first.

Leading off the 2017 year, the Board of Commissioners worked long and hard in November of 2016 to once again pass a balanced budget. In this day and age when federal, state and county governments see costs rising and taxes increasing across the board, our Board presented a cost-effective and fiscally sound

budget to keep the township tax rate at 14 mills for an eighth straight year. We continue to meet with Township Manager Norm Kraus, Jr., Assistant Manager Marie Hartman, and our various department heads and supervisors from the police, road, park, and sewer departments to make sure we hold costs and operate efficiently. Our goal is always to provide the best possible services for our township residents while maintaining and keeping our overall township costs in line as much as possible.

A key to any municipality nowadays is to maintain the businesses already in the township and look to add and grow new business opportunities. Development has come to the top of the commissioners' priority list. Construction on the homes at Clairmont Manor, a mixture of Maronda and Dan Ryan homes, continue to sell almost as soon as they are finished. A NOTE FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

2016 proved to be a challenging one for our administrative staff, as well as our employees, in general. With fiscal responsibility a major goal for all departments, we proceeded to run our administrative, police, park, road, and sewage departments as efficiently as possible, as per the guidelines set by the Board of Commissioners.

With Marie Hartman, our Township Engineer and Assistant Manager; Barbara Swearingen, our Financial Manager and Peggy Santia, our Human Resources and Payroll Manager, I have a strong team of leaders dedicated to making things run smoothly here in the office and out in the field for the township. The four of us work closely with the Township Board of Commissioners to carry out policy and make financial decisions that are judicious and keep the residents' of Hopewell best interests in mind. We always look for the best vendors that provide the best service and do it at the most competitive price.

Our Board of Commissioners face a challenge every year to keep that 14 mil tax rate in place, and for the eighth straight year, there is no tax increase from the township side of business. There was a modest bump in sewer rates part way through 2016, but that became necessary due to the rising cost of equipment, parts, and materials needed to run our two main sewage plants and 10 pump stations. Once again, our

services from the public works department remain strong and consistent for our residents. The statistics of a first class township of approximately 12,700 people, encompassing 17.2 square miles, as well as 75 miles of local roads and 297 streets, and 5,400 residential homes and business establishments combined is a lot of territory to cover. We are the largest municipality in Beaver County, but continue to maintain our service level at a very high rate of efficiency in spite of the size of the township.

Our 2016 goal to launch a new accounting system, as well as a new billing system for the sewer department, was accomplished. This was no minor feat, considering we are operating with just enough personnel to cover all major jobs without having any excess employment costs or overhead. Just like the federal, state, and county governments, the reality of the economics we face here in Hopewell are the same, with our utilities going up, as well as our insurance for the township, as well as, our employees. We shop all of our hundreds of vendors to find the best and most competitive prices, but that is an on-going struggle. My promise to you is that we will continue to explore ways to keep costs in line, use the best systems out there to be more efficient, and make sound business decisions that will help the township come out on top!

Development will continue to be

a strong focus of mine on behalf of the Board of Commissioners. The Kane Road luxury apartments being built where the old Kane Road Drive-In used to be look awesome and should be up and ready for business by late spring/early summer of this year. The homes being built at Clairmont Manor are going up at a brisk pace and many of them have already been sold. The homes in that plan are even selling before the lot has been developed. Without going into detail, I can say that the commissioners, along with Zoning Officer John Bates and Assistant Manager Marie Hartman and myself, are in discussions with several other developers for other possible project be located here in Hopewell Township. Development means progress and also means additional tax base money, something we all know is a good thing for the township.

I know last year I had planned on starting a Hopewell Township Business Association, but unfortunately, my wife was struggling with a second round of cancer and I had to delay things until this year. I will be out to visit each and every business in the township to get everyone involved. We will be meeting to exchange marketing ideas and what we, at the township level, can do for our businesses to help promote everyone's day-to-day business and work to form a strong Business Association, with much of it running through the newly designed township website we are

going to be launching this year. It's a win-win for all!

In today's ever changing business climate, even government entities like Hopewell Township must keep up with the social media wave and keep pace with all avenues of opportunity. The good news is our Hopewell Township website, www.hopewelltp.com, continues to grow. We had over 138,000 hits on the website in 2016. We are re-designing our website in 2017 to make it more informative, animated and flashier. Our Township Facebook page now hosts over 1,800 followers. Our Facebook page for the police department has grown immensely to over 1,500 followers and our Hopewell Park Facebook page now claims over 1,100 followers. You can also follow the township news and happenings on Twitter and Instagram, as those have grown for us also.

On another great note, Hopewell Township was awarded Silver Level Status through the Sustainable Pennsylvania Community Certification Program in 2016. We are one of two

municipalities that have qualified thus far in Beaver County. The program rewards municipalities that save money, conserve resources and serve vibrant communities, we were graded on 131 different points of evaluation. I'm looking to boost our standing to Platinum as we improve in some areas.

General housecleaning issues that come across my desk that need attention include the following:

Our depository will re-open April 1st, 2017 and we will continue the photo ID system at the administration office for 2017. Any Hopewell Township resident wanting to use the depository will be required to have a new photo ID taken for 2017 at a cost of \$20.00. Residents who are 65 years or older are exempt from an annual fee, but will still need to come in and get a photo ID. Our depository guards will make decisions on costs of loads that come in on trucks, as well as construction materials that are brought to the depository. The township does operate the depository as a convenience to

our residents and the cost to keep the depository open runs a deficit for the township each year. Please keep that in mind as we try to offer you this service at a minimal fee.

If you notice a street light that is burnt out or blinking, please report the pole number and street address that is closest to the pole at 724-378-1460, extension 100. The township does pay Duquesne Light Company for the street lights regardless of whether the light works or not. Help us to stay energy-conscious.

Also keep in mind that Hopewell Township has an ordinance in place prohibiting solicitation without a permit. Any salesperson who comes to your door must have a photo ID badge issued by the township. Solicitors are NOT ALLOWED to be in the township after 5PM and NEVER on Sundays. If a salesperson comes to your door and does not have an ID badge, please call the Hopewell Township Police Department at 724-378-0557 or, after hours, the county non-emergency number at 724-775-0880. ■

Meet Marie Stratakis Hartman, P.E., Engineer/Assistant Manager

Marie is a graduate of Moon Area High School and received her B.S. and M.S. Degrees in Civil Engineering from the University of Pittsburgh, and a Business Administration Degree from Robert Morris University. Marie is a Professional Engineer and works closely with the Road Department, Sewer Department, Park Department, and Planning/Zoning Department and is dedicated to the advancement and promotion of Hopewell Township. She works very closely with all Developers and oversees all development projects in Hopewell Township. Marie also serves as the Hopewell Township Assistant Manager.



WATER POLLUTION CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Hopewell Township Water Pollution Control Department operates two (2) wastewater treatment facilities, ten (10) wastewater pumping stations, and the wastewater collection system within Hopewell Township. The Raccoon Creek Wastewater Treatment Facility is located on Pollack Lane and is designed to treat an average daily wastewater flow of 2,500,000 gallons per day and a maximum daily wastewater flow of 12,000,000 gallons per day. The Raccoon Creek Wastewater Treatment Facility serves approximately 3,678 homes and businesses within Hopewell Township. The Wickham Village Wastewater Treatment Facility is located off Diamond Street and is designed to treat an average daily wastewater flow of 120,000 gallons per day and a maximum daily water flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day. The Wickham Village Wastewater Treatment Facility serves approximately 290 homes within Hopewell Township.

Hopewell Township, like many neighboring municipalities, is taking steps to improve the wastewater collection and treatment system through improved operation and maintenance. Accordingly, Hopewell Township has developed Sewer System Rules and Regulations that set forth requirements for connection to the sanitary sewer system and discharge requirements.

1. A primary focus of Hopewell Township's efforts is the removal of surface water and

subsurface water from the wastewater collection system. The discharge of storm water, surface water, and subsurface water or the connection of downspouts, roof drains, surface drains, areaway drains, foundation drains, interior french drains, stairwell drains, and/or sump pump discharges into a sanitary sewer lateral is absolutely prohibited by our existing legislation. Entrance of this excess flow into our sewer system causes the capacity of the sewer lines, pump stations, and wastewater treatment facilities to be exceeded, which causing untreated sewage to overflow from the system and discharge into nearby streams and waterways, which adversely affect our environment.

2. Oil and grease are not permitted to be discharged into the sanitary sewer system.

Oil and grease solidifies within the sewer system and can cause sewer system obstructions and the backup of sewage into homes. Oil and grease should be properly disposed of by homeowners and businesses. Commercial establishments that engage in the preparation of food must install appropriate oil and grease separators.

3. Any alteration or replacement of a sanitary sewer lateral requires the issuance of a Restoration Permit by Hopewell Township.

Hopewell Township has established specifications regarding construction of sanitary sewer laterals. These specifications and Standard Drawings are available on the Hopewell Township web site

at www.hopewelltp.com. Any alteration or replacement of a sanitary sewer lateral must be inspected by Hopewell Township.

4. **A Certificate of Compliance is required to be obtained from the Hopewell Township Sewer Department prior to the sale or transfer of improved and sewered real property.** The purpose of a Certificate of Compliance is to verify conformity with Hopewell Township regulations regarding the exclusion of surface water and subsurface water from the sanitary sewer system.

Applications are available on the Hopewell Township web site at www.hopewelltp.com. After payment of the required fee, Hopewell Township personnel will conduct a dye test of all roof drains, downspouts, parking area drains, driveway drains, area drains, interior/exterior sumps, and any other potential sources of surface water or subsurface water. If the property passes the dye test, a Certificate of Compliance is issued and is valid for a period of five (5) years from the date of issuance. □

StormwaterPA

Hopewell Township has been designated as an MS4 Community by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. MS4 stands for SMALL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEMS. As part of this designation, Hopewell Township is responsible to:

1. **Provide Public Education** regarding the direct connection between the storm sewer system and the Ohio River, Raccoon Creek, and Flaugherty Run.
2. **Solicit Public Participation** to "getting the word out" about the benefits of protecting of the watersheds within Hopewell Township.
3. **Conduct regular inspections** of each storm sewer discharge to identify, report, and correct any inappropriate release of materials into Waters of the Commonwealth.
4. **Reinforce existing procedures to address erosion and sedimentation control** during construction projects.
5. **Reinforce existing ordinances to provide for construction and maintenance** of storm water facilities, such as ponds and basins, that provide post-construction storm water management.

6. **Establish pollution prevention and good housekeeping measures** for municipal vehicles and equipment.

Hopewell Township is completing its inspection and reporting activities for operating year 2016. Residents are reminded that the storm sewer system works wonderfully for both storm water and for any inappropriate item that enters the storm sewer system. Every gum wrapper, pop can, piece of trash, drop of spilled motor oil, paint, chemical, fertilizer, all pet waste, and lawn clippings, that enters the storm sewer system is efficiently delivered to our streams and rivers. Hopewell Township is asking each resident to review their daily activities and to be cognizant of any illicit discharges. We should all strive to insure that the source of our drinking water and recreation be kept as clean as possible, free of fertilizers, oils, chemicals, pet waste, lawn clippings, and trash. □

FROM THE DESK OF CHIEF UHRMACHER



Police Chief, Brian Uhrmacher

Brian came to Hopewell Township in November 2014, after more than 30 years of experience with the Greece NY Police Department, where he began as a Dispatcher and rose to the rank of Captain.

He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy's 248th Session and holds a Master's Degree in Legal Studies/Homeland Security from California University of Pennsylvania. Brian and his wife reside in Hopewell Township and they have three adult sons.

There were several noteworthy incidents and investigations in Hopewell during 2016. We were able to attain many successful conclusions, often times working with other agencies at the local, state, and federal level. The efforts of your Hopewell officers resulted in a 6% reduction in Part I crimes (criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft), which are reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation as part of the Uniform Crime Report. Though we are not in a position to promise a similar decline in numbers for this year, we will continue to make our best attempt to do so. The officers' efforts in the area of traffic safety were recognized in 2016, with the AAA Gold Award. The award takes into consideration not only enforcement, but also accident statistics and the work done in the area of education.

2016 was marked by several personnel related changes within the Hopewell Township Police Department. In May, Off. Jim Lewis, a 36 year veteran of the department, called it a career. Jim's work in the community, particularly with the youth in the community, is greatly missed. In July, Off. Jill Banovsky was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. In early December, we had four new officers join our ranks: Corey McNally, Joe Daransky, Brandon Fedorka and Kyle Fabyanic. All of the officers completed an extensive selection process and bring prior police experience with them. We are happy to have them with us. In late December, Offs. Eric Yerdon and Ron McMasters were promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Sgt. Yerdon will have responsibility for the daylight shift, Sgt. Banovsky the afternoon shift and Sgt. McMasters will be supervising the department's officers during the hours of darkness. The promotion of the three Sergeants in 2016 was a major step in the goal to form a command structure within the department.

In an effort to recognize the good work that our officers do, the establishment of a departmental award system is being developed. The first such award announced is an Officer of the Year Award. For 2016, the Hopewell Police Department Officer of the Year, as chosen by her colleagues, is Sgt. Jill Banovsky. Sgt. Banovsky became the first officer promoted to the rank of Sergeant in the department, in over 20 years. Sgt. Banovsky will always have the distinction of becoming

the first female promoted to a supervisory rank, in department history. With the promotion comes new administrative tasks and one that Sgt. Banovsky has taken on is filling the department's weekly work schedule. While certainly not an enviable task, Sgt. Banovsky completes the duty in an admirable and thoughtful way. One officer's nomination write up stated, "what also stands out to me is her dedication, preparation, thoroughness". Specifically cited, was Sgt. Banovsky's efforts in an unattended death investigation, when she was scheduled for vacation time and days off, but "still chose to be here and active in that investigation". And finally, Sgt. Banovsky's presence at various community events is both noted and welcome.

Unfortunately, the news was not all good for law enforcement in 2016, as the number of line of duty deaths nationwide reversed a downward trend. News of multiple officers killed in single incidents became far too common. Our region was not spared from tragedy, as Canonsburg Officer Scott Bashoum and Pennsylvania State Trooper Landon Weaver both lost their lives investigating domestic related incidents. Throughout the numerous devastating incidents, we were shown appreciation by members of this community. We greatly appreciate the signs of thanks shown by our residents — from food items delivered to the station to gift baskets made up by a community group to hundreds of cards made up by our school children to invitations to community prayer services. You will continue to see our officers at community related events, as well as expanded programs such as the Safety Day that was held at the Hopewell Shopping Center in October and our involvement with the Beaver County Community/Law Enforcement Coalition. We recognize the partnership that we have with our community and understand the importance of it.

Efforts in the area of policies and procedures continue, as well as sending our officers to additional training. This all in an effort to provide the community with the most professional service we possibly can.

To all property owners, residents, and others reading this article, I hope 2017 finds you in good health and in good spirits. My previous contributions to the *Hopewell Highlights* have been reports of Construction, Ordinances and Regulations concerning the use of property within the township. Similar to other reports, construction is underway for 2017, new homes are being built at Clairmont Manor on Brodhead Road, apartments are being completed at Kane at Gray's Landing (former Kane Rd Drive-In), and Betters Real Estate Holdings just completed a substantial development, a Warehouse and Laydown Yard at the Riverfront Industrial District. Other projects are anticipated for 2017 and will keep the township busy growing toward the future. Please be reminded to apply for permits early-on in your project planning.

Next, instead of listing pages of Ordinances and Regulations, I thought I would post some historical information about the township that I find interesting. Please realize that you can find Zoning & Construction Regulations as simple as (1) in a previous Newsletter, (2) at www.hopewelltp.com or (3) by calling the Zoning Office at 724-375-3112.

Prior to 1812, Hopewell Township was part of Moon Township. After 1812, Hopewell stood alone and was much larger. Hopewell lost Independence Township in 1848, West Aliquippa in 1894, Woodlawn in 1908, South Heights in 1909 and New Sheffield in 1926, resulting in the township's boundary of today.

When identifying persons, places, or things, names are used. Names can document history. Brodhead Road is named after Col. Daniel Brodhead. Brodhead used the road as a supply route from Fort Pitt to Fort McIntosh (Beaver, Pa) during the Revolutionary War. The road had been cut through the wilderness by General Lachlan McIntosh (Clearview Estates on McIntosh Drive).

With that in mind, during the 1790's pioneers who settled in the Hopewell area were William Greene, Hugh Morrow, Robert Ritchie, Robert Temple and Elihu Veazey. One such early settler was David Scott who served as the first Justice of Peace and gave the Village of Scottsville (Sr. High & Shopping Center Area) its name. John Gibson's 1769 early claim of 300 acres at the

opening of the Pennsylvania Land Office for Logstown (lands of J & L Steel) started Hopewell's settlement. Robert Agnew settled on Raredon's Run Independence, James Jordan settled near Five Points, and William Davis at Plan 11 Extension. Many of these land areas were acquired as Revolutionary War Grants for service or injury.

Further, early settler Peter Maratta married Nancy McGee. Thus we have Maratta Road and McGee Avenue in Agnew Heights. There are also many other early family names throughout the Township such as Laird Drive, Steuers Lane, Davidson Heights, Wallace Circle, Morrow Way, Morrow Road, Morrow Avenue, Buss Road, Temple Heights, Sohn Road, Scottsville, and Veazey Cemetery. Most intriguing, our township name, "Hopewell".

The *History of Beaver County* published by A. Warner in 1888 suggests that Hopewell was so named because of its relationship with Washington County. A portion of Washington County became Beaver County in 1800 and there existed a Hopewell Township in Washington County at that time. Perhaps that influence emerged in the readjustment of townships in Beaver County in 1812. Another possibility is brought forth by Rev. Joseph H. Bausman in the *History of Beaver County*. Bausman reports the name Hopewell was taken from a Presbyterian Church that existed at that time in Findlay Township. In Pennsylvania, numerous churches and communities are named Hopewell which was a popular title in the New World to express faith, hope, and love. I often receive calls at the Zoning Office meant for the Hopewell Township in Washington, York or Huntington Counties and even the very popular Hopewell, New Jersey.

Likewise, referring to names that identify specific land areas of the township, i.e. plans or subdivisions, see if you can pick out yours. Could it be Agnew Heights, Aliquippa Airport, Andrews, Bradbury, Boggs Hollow, Brodmont Village, Buchanan Heights, Chatam Woods, Clark Manor, Clearview Estates, Cochran Acres, Creese Plan, Crestmont Village, Davidson or Davidson Heights, Edgewood Manor, Five Points, Glenwall Village, Gringo or Gringo Terrace, Green Garden, Hall Farm, Hillcrest, Hopewell Heights, Kings Mill Manor, Longvue Acres, Meadow Wood, Morrow Farm, Nero Plan, Oakhurst, Ridgeway Park, Service Creek, Sheffield, New Sheffield,

Sheffield Heights or Sheffield Terrace, Straub Farm, Sunnybrook, Wickham Village, or Woodlawn Park. I might of missed one, let me know. These titles are becoming forgotten even though they will always be a matter of record in Beaver Counties Recorder of Deeds. Some current titles of newly developed subdivision plans have evolved such as Autumn Ridge, Clairmont, Independence Square, Kane Heights, Kane Orchards, and Sweet Brier. If you look at you tax bill or the deed of your property, you will find some such description telling you the lot number and plan name from when the property was planned, named and recorded.

Moreover, several township neighborhood subdivisions have a sign or monument identifying the plan. Usually, they are the newer developments. These ID Markers were erected by the developer of the Plan and have been maintained by Associations or Individuals. The Clearview Civic Club maintains a neighborhood sign at Gringo & McIntosh Drive. The Veazey Cemetery Sign has been refurbished from time to time by individuals from neighboring properties. Sadly, most of the ID markers from the older plans and subdivisions are gone. Mr. Rick Miller, a lifelong resident and history buff, recalls earlier years when most neighborhood plans were identified by markers or signs. Our conversations have been around getting some of the ID Markers replaced. He thinks it would be a good idea for identification and also add a little hometown charm that is fading. I, myself, remember back in grade school when the neighborhood ID "Cochran Acres, Davidson Heights, Clearview, ..." would be announced on the PA System when it was time to load the buses to go home. Let me know your comments.

Finally, it was fun looking back at some Township history, however, let me give you a Top Ten List of Township Ordinance & Zoning Rules and Regulations for 2017.

1. Ord No. 96-12 - Requires all residential & commercial buildings to be identified with 4" numbers that are clearly visible from the street for Emergency 911 Identification.
2. Ord. No. 93-9 - Requires that all materials for refuse collection must be stored in water tight containers with lids. Containers cannot be stored at curbside prior to pick-up.
3. Ord. No. 72-10 - Requires property owners to cut, remove and maintain grass and ground cover vegetation. Please trim hedges at street corners, driveways, and fire hydrants.
4. Ord. No. 93-1 - Prohibits the use of ATV's & dirt bikes within 300 feet of residential buildings and Township streets.
5. Ord. No. 93-10 - Prohibits outdoor burning of any kind except recreational cooking.
6. Ord. No. 77-6 - Requires pet owners to clean up and dispose of animal waste.
7. Ord. No. 08-13 - Requires that owners of real property abutting a sidewalk to keep the sidewalk in good order and repair.
8. Zoning 04-01 - Mandates that recreational vehicles and equipment are stored in the rear yard. (You cannot park a trailer on a Township street).
9. Zoning 04-01 - Requires permits for sheds, decks and fences.
10. Zoning 04-01 - Prohibits the general storage of junk and miscellaneous items. 📍

HOPEWELL COMMUNITY PARK — RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Park hours are 8:00am to 10:00pm - Winter 8:00am until dusk
2. No bench or table is to be changed or removed without township approval.
3. Do not deface, injure, remove, cut or damage any of the trees, plants, shrubs, turf, buildings or fixtures.
4. Do not annoy others in the park.
5. No persons or group totaling 10 or more can gather in a park pavilion without a Township permit.
6. Use of shelters by permit only. Each permit requires a deposit and rental fee.
7. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES are RESTRICTED. Alcohol may be consumed if the following condition is met: more food than alcohol is present. Consumption of alcohol by underage persons is illegal and strictly prohibited.
8. The exclusive use of alcohol is not permitted in the park.
9. Do not set up a booth, table or stand for the sale of any articles without written Township consent.
10. No dumping of garbage, waste or litter in the park.
11. Do not deface any posted notice or regulation.
12. Do not place any notice or placard without Township approval.
13. No open fires permitted. Fires only made in stoves or special fireplaces provided. Charcoal or wood fires only. Do not use park wood.
14. No discharging of firearms, archery or any other propelled devices in the park.
15. No hunting or trapping on park property.
16. No unlicensed vehicle, all-terrain vehicle or motorcycle or dirt bike in the park.
17. Do not bring pets into the park.
18. No swimming, skating or boating in or on the park lake, unless approved by the Township.
19. No sledding in the park.
20. Do not exceed the 5 mph park speed limit. Do not park in the grass or along the park road areas.
21. Do not climb, sit, stand or walk on any tree, sign, building or other park structures.
22. No tents, shacks, shelters, trailers or other overnight camping structures permitted unless approved by the Township.
23. No hobby devices in the park unless approved by the Township.
24. No "live bait" fishing.
25. No inflatable, playground apparatus, live animals or petting zoo will be permitted without prior approval of the Township management.

VIOLATIONS: of any of the above rules and regulations shall result, upon conviction, of a fine up to \$300.00 and costs of prosecution for each and every offense. **NOTICE:** Please call the Hopewell Township Police Department or the Park Caretaker if you see any violation. Your help and concern will make our Community Park a better place to visit and enjoy.

PERMIT INFORMATION: All permits required by this ordinance must be posted at specific confines at the park. For a permit or more information, call the Hopewell Township Municipal Building at 724-378-1460; Monday through Friday 9am to 4pm.



All the soap, suds, and oily grit run along the curb, then into the storm drain and directly into our lakes, streams and into coastal waters including the Chesapeake Bay. And that causes pollution which is unhealthy for fish. So how do you avoid this whole mess? Easy. Wash your car on grass or gravel instead of the street. Or better yet, take it to a car wash where the water gets treated and recycled.



When our pets leave these little surprises, rain washes all that pet waste and bacteria into our storm drains. And then pollutes our waterways. So what to do? Simple. Dispose of it properly (responsibly in the trash). Then that little surprise gets treated like it should.



Leaking oil from car to street. And is washed from the street into the storm drain and into our lakes, streams and into coastal waters including the Chesapeake Bay. Now imagine the number of cars in the area and you can imagine the amount of oil that finds its way from leaky quads into our water. So please, fix all leaks.



You fertilize the lawn. Then it rains. The rain washes the fertilizer along the curb, into the storm drain, and directly into our lakes, streams and into coastal waters including the Chesapeake Bay. This causes algae to grow, which uses up oxygen that fish need to survive. So if you fertilize, please follow directions and use sparingly.

DISPOSE OF YOUR UNUSED MEDICATION AT THE HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT

Through a partnership between the Hopewell Police Department and the Beaver County District Attorney, there is a Prescription Drug Take Back Box in the lobby of the Police Station at 1700 Clark Blvd.

The box gives you a safe route to dispose of unused medications. This effort helps keep drugs out of the hands of our youth and also protects the environment through the safe disposal of the medications.

Medications accepted at the box: Prescriptions, Prescription Patches, Prescription Medications, Prescription Ointments, Over-the-counter medications, Vitamins, Samples and Medications for pets.

Items not accepted include: Hydrogen Peroxide, inhalers, aerosol cans, ointments, medication from businesses or clinics, needles and thermometers.



ORDINANCE NO. 2011-01 PEDDLING & SOLICITATION ORDINANCE

Ordinance 2011-01 was enacted and ordained to regulate the distribution of certain materials, peddling, soliciting, and related activities within Hopewell Township. The registration of persons engaged in the above-mentioned activities is required so that the identity of persons going door-to-door or distributing materials within the Township may be established, so that general regulations may be more effectively enforced for the protection and maintenance of the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the Township and to prevent dishonest business practices and deter criminal activity in the Township.

This practice is allowed only when a permit has been obtained from the Township. We have had several inquiries to obtain permits in recent weeks, some having already been issued. That being said, this is a good time to inform you of some of the points of the ordinance.

Anyone coming to your door to solicit goods or services MUST have an ID badge issued by the township (pictured below). The solicitor can only go door-to-door Monday through Saturday from 9am to 5pm. They should be displaying the badge on their person and it will have an expiration date on the badge along with the company name. In order to obtain a permit, the solicitor must fill out an application and submit it to the police department, where a modified background check is completed. Some applications have been denied, for the safety of our residents.

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP IS NOW EQUIPPED WITH AUTOMATIC EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS (AED)

According to the American Heart Association, cardiac arrest can happen anywhere, even in your workplace. Giving CPR and using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) can greatly increase the victim's chance of survival.




