



Meet Andy Brunette, Township Manager/Controller . . .

The 2013 calendar year presented many challenges for the Board of Commissioners, which was faced with the dilemma of transforming the Township into a more cost-efficient operating entity as well as trying to bring more corporate development into Hopewell. As the cost of doing business continues to increase, it becomes more difficult to maintain the high quality level of service that the residents of Hopewell demand and deserve. In 2013 all Township departments were assigned the task to cut costs, work smarter, and be more efficient by putting together a three year budgetary plan. The Board of Commissioners started the process of developing a comprehensive marketing plan to attract and encourage development within Hopewell Township. Because of an entire team effort of all Township employees, the Commissioners and Township management team were able to maintain sewer rates as well as maintain the Township real estate tax rate at its current level of 14



mils. The Board of Commissioners and management team will continue to strive to utilize Township assets and personnel more efficiently as well as utilize technology to assist in becoming more efficient and cut unnecessary spending.


The Administration's goal for 2013 is to aggressively pursue more cost cutting measures in both the General and Sewer Funds in an effort to make sure the Township is operating as efficiently as possible. As part of the marketing strategic plan, the Board of Commissioners will continue to aggressively pursue relationships with county, state and federal officials for the future development of Interstate 376, to improve and seek businesses for our current riverfront and Business Park, as well as to seek grants for the continued development of our community park. Hopewell is in the proper position to achieve these visionary goals. The advancement towards these goals will bring economic security, stabilization and growth for Hopewell. The future visionary development will expand the tax base, which will help stabilize tax rates and residential sewer rates. These projects will also benefit the area by increasing the job base in Hopewell.

In 2013 residents can look forward to new programs and advancements on the Township website. 

website to receive the emergency and important announcements via text message and by email alert messages. Residents in 2013 can also sign up for ACH payments for payment of their sewage billing. ACH (Automated Clearing House) allows payments to come out automatically from either your checking or savings account. Residents are also reminded that they have the ability to pay their sewer payments by credit or debit card at either www.hopewelltwp.com or www.hopewellbill.com. Residents are reminded that the Township offers a sewer assistance program for residents that qualify. Information and applications can be picked up at the municipal building or downloaded off the internet from our website.

In 2013 Hopewell Township plans to invest \$300,000 in Township Roads, as well as a \$350,000 investment into the construction of the upgrade of the Sharon Grange Road pump station. Both projects will be completely financed through existing Township Funds. The Township will start the process of the development of a G.P.S. (Global Positioning Satellite) to assist in the location of sewer and general infrastructure within the Township. The G.P.S. system will be a tremendous asset in order for the Township to better utilize its assets, as well as to help the workers to be more efficient. The G.P.S. system is on schedule to be operational in 2014. The Township was approved for a



D.C.N.R. grant in 2012 and plans on starting the development process on the additional 17 acres of land across from the existing Park that was acquired by the Township in 2011. Hopewell Township's Police Department can expect to receive two new 2013 Ford Taurus Interceptors. Hopewell Township's Public Works Department will receive a 2013 Ford F350 super duty utility truck as well as a 2013 Terrastar SFA 4x4 one ton dump truck. Township residents in 2013 will be able to continue to put their grass clippings in bags for curbside collection with their normally scheduled garbage collection by Waste Management on Mondays at no additional cost to the residents. The Township Administration office in 2013 will continue the photo ID system for the residents wishing to use the Township Depository. All residents who wish to use the Depository will be required to have a photo ID, which requires an annual fee of \$20.00. Residents who are 65 years of age or older are exempt from the annual fee, but are still required to have a photo ID in order to enter the Depository. The Administration office in 2013 will be working on a new call complaint system where residents will be able to log in complaints via the Township website, receive a confirmation of receipt, and email confirmation when the complaint has been satisfied. The Township believes this system will help us be more efficient in responding to and tracking residential complaints.

Please remember, if you notice a street light that is burned out or blinking, please report the pole number or the street address that is closest to the pole, to the Township at (724)-378-1460, ext. 100. Please be reminded that the Township pays Duquesne Light for the street lights regardless if the light is working or not. Therefore, the Township appreciates your support in reporting any inoperable street lights when you see them. Please also note that Hopewell Township has a solicitor ordinance for solicitation within the Township. Any salesperson who comes to your door must have photo ID permit badge issued by the Township. Solicitors are not allowed to be in the Township after 5pm and never on Sundays. If a salesperson comes to your door and does not have an ID badge, is there after 5pm, or on Sundays please call the Hopewell Township Police Department by dialing 911.

Lastly, the Township is always looking for volunteers for various Boards, recreation and community activities it holds throughout the year. If you would like to get involved, please contact the office or stop by the Municipal building for more information.

BUILDING & DEVELOPMENT REPORT

It is great to report that the rezoning of a parcel of land by the Township Commissioners in 2003 on Sohn Road has resulted in the construction of 100 new single family homes. The "Sweet Brier" Plan was developed by Maronda Homes, Imperial, PA. There are some great views overlooking the Ohio River and the final few homes are almost complete. Next, the Township is looking forward to the construction of another Maronda Homes subdivision of new homes. The proposed "Clairmont Manor" Plan will also result in 100 new housing units. The Plan is located on Brodhead Road off Tee Line Drive. A second access will be from a new street, aka, "Casey Drive" via Creese Street at Five Points. The successful completion of this plan will insure a steady influx of new housing starts for the Township. Final planning and approvals have not been finalized at this time but hopefully 2013 will conclude the agreements to allow this plan to get underway.

Equally exciting is the continuing construction of the Patio Homes at the Village at Beaver Lakes. Minton & Sons are continuing constructing eight, four unit homes resulting in thirty-two (32) units. This housing is very upscale design and for some, a dream comes true to be living along the gorgeous Shadow Lakes Golf Club.

Looking throughout the rest of the Township, new home construction continues at a much smaller scale due to the availability of building lots, however, new housing starts do occur at various locations. Bachman Builder's have lots available at Valleyview Avenue off Kane Road for new home construction.

Likewise, the Township has realized the completion of the construction of the forty (40) unit "Westfield Towers" building designed strictly for area senior citizens age sixty-two (62) or older. This plan was awarded federal funding obtained through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The creation of this new affordable housing will be a welcome addition to our existing housing stock. The building

is located on Westfield Drive near the Hopewell Exit of Rt. 376.

Consequently, the Township's is fortunate to have a variety of housing types in today's real estate market. The existing inventory of homes are being maintained, upgraded and holding their values, while the addition of new and different types of housing will insure a diverse mix of stock, to uphold values in the future. Further in this report, you will see the importance of zoning regulations in effect to this end.

Moreover, the purpose of the following ordinances found in this report are to promote, protect and facilitate the public health, safety, general welfare and practical community development in order to accommodate reasonable overall community growth and to prevent blighting conditions and hazards. These are the basic provisions of Community Development Objectives on which these Ordinances are based.

In the way of Non-Residential Building, 2012 had many highlights that are noteworthy. The Beaver County Corporation for Economic Development proceeded with grading for additional site development at the Hopewell Industrial Park while Service Link continued interior renovations for tenant space improvements. Also, American Precision Powder Coating renovated & opened at the Airport Road Industrial Park. At our Shopping Centers, Roses Express, variety wholesalers, Forever Pittsburgh Sports Memorabilia and Aimee's Floral & More opened at the Hopewell Shopping Center. At the Green Garden Plaza, The Palms Brazilian Steakhouse, a 6800 sq. ft. restaurant, suited for banquets & weddings, now provides a unique dining experience. The Hopewell Deli & More changed and expanded and continues at the Crestmont Center. Further, the latest service provider would be Skyline Chiropractic, owned by Ronald Zorn, which opened at 2253 Brodhead Road. Skyline provides complete chiropractic services. These projects add to the overall assessment value of the Township's total worth and will provide a foundation for other businesses to locate, renovate or expand, providing for future growth.

Building/Zoning Permits

A Building / Zoning Permit shall be required prior to the beginning of the erection, construction, alteration or addition to any building or portion thereof situate in Hopewell Township.

- Zoning Permits are issued for sheds, decks, out buildings, fences and other accessory projects.
- Please apply for the proper permit prior to the commencement of your project.
- It is illegal to erect a fence without a Zoning Permit.
- Violators could be made to remove the construction and be cited before the District Magistrate

If you need to apply for a Building or Zoning Permit, don't wait until the last minute or start the job first. Planning is very important. It is possible that you may not be able to do the project exactly the way you wanted because of zoning or subdivision regulations. This oversight can be timely and costly. Take the time to inquire.

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP PLANNING COMMISSION AND APPEALS BOARDS

The Hopewell Township Planning Commission meets on the fourth Thursday of each month unless advertised. The Planning Commission performs many diverse functions for the Planning and Development of Hopewell Township. As authorized by the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code the powers and duties of the Planning Commission include but are not limited to 1.) preparing the comprehensive plan for the development of the municipality, 2.) make recommendations concerning amendments to the official map of the Twp., 3.) make recommendations concerning amendments to the zoning

ordinance and other ordinances of the Twp., 4) recommend and administer subdivision, land development and planned residential development regulations, 5.) promote public interest in and understanding of, the comprehensive plan and planning, 6.) hold public meeting and hearings, 7.) present testimony before any board, and 8.) review the zoning ordinance, subdivision and land development ordinance, official map, planned residential development regulations and such other ordinances and regulations governing the development of land and make recommendations concerning the administration of such.

THE HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP ZONING HEARING BOARD

The zoning hearing board is created to help assure fair and equitable application and administration of the zoning ordinance. It is a “local court” for zoning matters. The board can hear various appeals and can grant relief from the literal enforcement of the ordinance. It must, however, follow the procedures prescribed by the zoning ordinance and by the Municipal Planning Code (MPC) and can neither make nor modify policy.

The zoning hearing board has specific function in nine areas. These are the nine areas:

- Substantive challenges to the validity of any land use ordinance;
- Challenges raising procedural questions or alleged defects in the enactment or adoption process of a land use ordinance;
- Appeals from the determination of the zoning officer
- Appeals from a determination by the municipal engineer or the zoning officer with regards to the administration of any flood plain or flood hazard regulations;

- Applications for variances;
- Applications for special exceptions;
- Appeals from determinations regarding the administration of transfers of development rights or performance density provisions;
- Appeals from the zoning officer’s determination regarding preliminary opinions; and
- Appeals from the municipal engineer’s or zoning officer’s determination in the administration of any land use ordinance regarding stormwater management and erosion and sediment control not involving subdivision, land development or planned residential development applications.

THE HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP BUILDING CODE APPEALS BOARD

The building code appeals board hears and decides appeals of orders, decisions or determinations made by the building official relative to the application and interpretation of the building code. Applications for appeals shall be based on a claim the true intent of the code or the rules legally adopted thereunder have been interpreted, the provisions of the code do not fully apply, or an equally good or better form of construction is proposed. The board shall have no authority to waive requirements of the code.

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

The Hopewell Township Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is an all hazards plan consisting of a basic plan and position specific Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). Contained within many of the SOPs are "Nuclear Power Plant Incident Response Actions".

The Hopewell Township EOP employs a multi-agency operational structure that uses the Incident Management System based upon the National Incident Management System (NIMS).

The purpose of the EOP is to provide for the protection of persons and property in Hopewell Township in the event of a natural or man-caused emergency or disaster, in accordance with the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa. C.S., Sections 7101-7707, also referenced as P.L. 1332.

The EOP establishes procedures to alert the public and provide information and appropriate protective action instructions, if necessary. Also, the Plan provides for coordination and use of available Township resources during an emergency.

The EOP defines the role and responsibilities of Township Officials and the Emergency Management Coordinator(s). The response plan defines emergency functions and makes assignments to Township and volunteer staff.

The response plan is designed to assure coordination and cooperation with County efforts in accordance with the Beaver County Emergency Operations Plan.

The hazards that pose the potential threats to Hopewell Township are: flooding, hazardous materials accidents, storms, tornadoes, dam failure, droughts, nuclear power plant accidents and nuclear attacks.

The Emergency Operations Plan covers a wide range of possibilities from slowly developing emergencies to disasters without warning. It is intended to cover disasters resulting from any hazards whether of great magnitude or localized in their impact.

The Board of Commissioners is responsible for the protection and safety of the public in Hopewell Township and will exercise direction and control of its Emergency Management Agency and response activities within the Township.

Home Pickup Program for Household Hazardous Waste Appointments Begin January 1, 2013

As part of the residential solid waste and recycling contract with Waste Management, you have a convenient new opportunity to dispose of your Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) safely, easily and responsibly. Introducing **At Your Door Special CollectionSM**, a new residential service offered by WM to provide year-round HHW collections for you.

HOW DOES IT WORK?



1. To participate, you must contact the Call Center (1-800-449-7587) to set up a collection appointment.

The Call Center operators will guide you through the steps toward a safe and successful collection. You will be asked several questions, including your address and the type and amount of materials available for collection. You will be provided a convenient collection date and information about where to place the HHW kit for collection. A kit will be sent to your home in plenty of time for you to gather and pack your materials.



2. Preparing for collection

The HHW kit includes a program instruction sheet and other items to help pack and secure household hazardous waste. All materials such as gasoline, poisons, pesticides and aerosols, must be placed into the kit. Other items may be placed outside the Kit.



3. HHW material is collected



On the scheduled date, the customer service technician will collect materials directly from your home.

They will sort and pack the materials for proper transportation, recycling and disposal. Participants will receive a postage-paid survey card to complete and mail back to help track the program.

4. You have more material than will fit into the Kit?

Managing Household Hazardous Waste: The best method of managing Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) is to prevent its generation in the first place. This involves selecting the least toxic item "to do the job" and buying only the minimum amounts necessary. Buying in large quantities is not a bargain if half of it has to be discarded in the future. Please consider buying environmentally friendly products.

Did You Know?

- Latex paint is not a hazardous waste. It can often be donated to community groups and other organizations for re-use. Please consider this option before disposal.
- Used motor oil is not hazardous, but may pollute our groundwater, waterways and soil if not properly managed. Many automotive stations, auto parts and supply stores will accept used motor oil for recycling.
- Automotive batteries may be exchanged at the place of purchase. Many battery retailers offer recycling even if you are not purchasing a new battery. In some cases there may be a charge. Some scrap yards will also purchase lead acid batteries.

HOPEWELL COMMUNITY PARK-RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Park hours are 8:00 am to 10:00 pm-winter 8:00 am until dusk.
2. No bench or table is to be changed or removed without township approval.
3. Do not deface, injure, remove, cut or damage any of the trees, plants, shrubs, turf, buildings or fixtures.
4. Do not annoy others in the park.
5. No persons or group totaling 10 or more can gather in a park pavilion without a Township permit.
6. Use of shelters by permit only. Each permit requires a deposit and rental fee.
7. **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES** are **RESTRICTED**. Alcohol may be consumed if the following condition is met: more food than alcohol is present. Consumption of alcohol by underage persons is illegal and strictly prohibited.
8. The exclusive use of alcohol is not permitted in the park.
9. Do not set up a booth, table or stand for the sale of any articles without written Township consent..
10. No dumping of garbage, waste or litter in the park.
11. Do not deface any posted notice or regulation.
12. Do not place any notice or placard without Township approval.
13. No open fires permitted. Fires only made in stoves or special fireplaces provided. Charcoal or wood fires only. Do not use park wood.
14. No discharging of firearms, archery or other propelled devices in the park.
15. No hunting or trapping on park property.
16. No unlicensed vehicle, all-terrain vehicle or motorcycle or dirt bike in the park.
17. Do not bring pets into the park.
18. No swimming, skating or boating in or on the park lake, unless approved by the Township.
19. No sledding in the park.
20. Do not exceed the 5 mph park speed limit. Do not park in the grass or along the park road areas.
21. Do not climb, sit, stand or walk on any tree, sign, building or other park structures.
22. No tents, shacks, shelters, trailers or other overnight camping structures permitted unless approved by the Township.
23. No hobby devices in the park unless approved by the Township.
24. No "live bait" fishing.
25. No inflatable or playground apparatus will be permitted without approval of the Township Management.

VIOLATIONS: of any of the above rules and regulations shall result, upon conviction, of a fine up to \$300.00 and costs of prosecution for each and every offense. NOTICE: Please call the Hopewell Township Police Department or the Park Caretaker if you see any violation. Your help and concern will make our Community Park a better place to visit and enjoy.

PERMIT INFORMATION: All permits required by this ordinance must be posted at specific confines at the park. For a permit or information call the Hopewell Township Municipal Building at 724-378-1460 between the hours of 8:30am to 4:30pm, Monday thru Friday.

RULES FOR OUTDOOR BURNING

OUTDOOR BURNING- no outdoor fire/burning of any nature or for any purpose shall be kindled or maintained in the township of Hopewell except as listed in the following:

- a) an outdoor fire may be maintained if done so pursuant to a permit from the Department of Environmental Resources; any such fire shall only be maintained within the strict confines of said permit.
- b) An outdoor fire maybe kindled and maintained for cooking purposes so long as said fire is maintained only for cooking purposes.

Not withstanding any other provision of this section, the Fire Marshall may prohibit any or all outdoor fires when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fire hazardous.

Pavilion Rental Information

Pavilions are available for rental beginning in mid-February of each year. Reservations must be made at the Municipal Building, 1700 Clark Blvd, Aliquippa, PA. RESERVATIONS CANNOT BE MADE OVER THE PHONE. Payment must be in the form of two checks, one for the rental fee and the other for the deposit, which is \$50 for all rentals. The deposit check will be returned to you after your event, provided the pavilion area is left in good condition and all equipment (volleyball, horseshoes, etc.), is returned.

The interior of the Larry Blaney Nature Center is being renovated to include wood floor refinishing, major cleaning, up-to-date lighting, air conditioning and updated electric service. We hope these improvements will provide the residents and visitors of Hopewell Community Park with a comfortable and welcoming place to gather, as well as serve as an educational resource for all. - At the Municipal Building Sewer Department Office, 1700 Clark Blvd, hours are 8:30 – 4:30.
- Drop-Off Box inside the Main Entrance of the Municipal Building – checks only.
- Night Drop Box at Municipal Building Parking Lot entrance, near Police Station, checks only.
- ACH, Automated Clearing House, applications are available at www.hopewelltp.com or at the Municipal Building. This is an automatic withdrawal of funds every quarter to pay your sewer bill.

Applications for the 2014 Sewer Assistance Program can be printed from www.hopewelltp.com or picked up at the Municipal Building. We will accept completed applications until January 31, 2014, either by mail or dropped off at the Municipal Building. Please follow the directions carefully and submit the proper documents with your application.



RESOLUTION NO. R-2012-02

Resolution No. R-2012-02 states that an annual fee of \$20 be imposed...”for use of the Depository by any Township resident”. Any Township resident wishing to use the Depository must go to the Municipal Building on an annual basis to obtain a photo identification card. This card must be renewed annually and must be presented at the Depository each time a resident seeks to enter the Depository to deposit yard waste or construction material. Residents who are 65 years of age or older are exempt from the annual \$20.00 fee but must obtain a one-time photo identification which will reflect their exemption but will not require annual renewal. No person will be permitted to enter the Depository without a photo identification card. The Township retains the right to suspend, terminate or revoke Depository privileges at any time. Hopewell Township Depository is located at 1955 Sohn Road, just past Hopewell Sr. High School.

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP COMMUNITY PARK RECIEVES \$87,000 GRANT FROM THE PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND NATURAL RESOURCESFOR CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONAL FACILITIES

Hopewell Township, situated in Beaver County, is a First Class Township with a population of 13,254 residents. Hopewell Township encompasses a land area of 17.2 square miles and borders the northwestern tip of Allegheny County. Hopewell Township has approximately 5,446 residential homes, as well as many business/commercial establishments and light industrial establishments. Over the years, the community has continued to grow and the Hopewell Township Board of Commissioners recognizes that with community growth comes an increased demand for recreational facilities and activities. Parks and recreation play a critical role in providing a high quality of life to residents within the community. Recreational assets attract business and encourage residential growth. In addition, as the park continues to grow and acquire additional property, a permanent green area within the community will be preserved for wildlife and conservation.

Hopewell Township has an outstanding community park, known as the Hopewell Township Community Park. The park encompasses 62 acres of primarily undeveloped woodlands, fields, and wetlands. Purchased in 1967, all recreation for the community is centralized at this site and is coordinated through the efforts of the Hopewell Township Park Board and Recreation Director. Some activities planned for 2013 include Winter Fest; Easter Egg Hunt; Youth Fishing Derby; Adult Fishing Derby; Rec-on-the-Run summer program for children; Camp Lakewood; Concerts in the Park; Movies in the Park; Park Fest; Barbecue Cook-Off and Blues Fest; Labor Day Car Cruise; Fall Fest; and the Visit with Santa. Hopewell Township also works with its Planning Commission, Beaver County, and the Hopewell Area School District to share facilities and programming ideas.

In an effort to continue with improvements and growth of the Hopewell Township Community Park, Hopewell Township acquired an additional 17.5 acres of undeveloped land adjacent to the existing park. The newly acquired property is well suited for the proposed improvements, which include a pavilion, sport court, toddler play area, swings, and parking lot.

Hopewell Township has been awarded an \$87,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) in support of proposed improvements at the Hopewell Township Community Park. The proposed improvements are consistent with existing facilities present on the adjacent Hopewell Community Park property. Portions of the newly-acquired property have steep slopes that do not make those areas suitable for development. The portion of the newly-acquired property located between Laird Drive and the stream is suitable for development, as is the upper portion of the property (future). The steep slope areas are entirely suitable for tree growth and nature watching.

The Hopewell Township officials work closely with the Parks and Recreation Board who operate and maintain park facilities and schedule recreational programming for area residents. The facilities and programs are open to both residents and visitors. The park expansion will follow similar protocol as the existing Hopewell Community Park, in which the natural terrain and wooded canopy are maintained to enhance wildlife and encourage nature watching. Minimal tree removal will occur for this project, including some brush, saplings, and lesser quality trees that are growing along the road bank, to provide room for grading and development. Trees and vegetation along the steep slope areas will not be disturbed.

Concept of Operations

- In a disaster emergency, the Township government will continue only those functions and services necessary to protect life and property.
- Emphasis will be to meet basic human needs such as food, shelter and medical care and to resume basic services such as water, electricity and sanitation, as soon as possible.
- The Emergency Management Coordinator will mobilize the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Hopewell Township Municipal Building, 1700 Clark Blvd., Hopewell Township, PA when and emergency situation requires it.
- The Emergency Management Organization Staff will follow prescribed standard operating procedures (SOPs) which describe in detail how their functions are carried out and utilize checklists as necessary.
- Any decision to implement protective actions will be made by Township

- Officials or, in their absence, the Emergency Management Coordinator.
- If required to evacuate, the Township Board and the Emergency Operations Center will relocate to the Ambridge Municipal Building. If possible, the EOC will be the last organization to leave the hazard area.
- During the recovery phase, the EMA will provide generally the same services as those provided by staff members and forces during the evacuation. Damage assessment will be expedited and a report forwarded through the County Emergency Management Agency.
- When more than one township or borough is affected by an emergency, the County will be responsible for direction and control.
- When more than one County is affected by an emergency, the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) will provide overall coordination, direction and control.

WATER POLLUTION CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Hopewell Township Water Pollution Control Department operates two (2) wastewater treatment facilities, nine (9) wastewater pumping stations, and the wastewater collection system within Hopewell Township. The Raccoon Creek Wastewater Treatment Facility is located on Pollack Lane and is designed to treat an average daily wastewater flow of 2,500,000 gallons per day and a maximum daily wastewater flow of 12,000,000 gallons per day. The Raccoon Creek Wastewater Treatment Facility serves approximately 3,678 homes and businesses within Hopewell Township. The Wickham Village Wastewater Treatment Facility is located off Diamond Street and is designed to treat an average daily wastewater flow of 120,000 gallons per day and a maximum daily wastewater flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day. The Wickham Village Wastewater Treatment Facility serves approximately 290 homes within Hopewell Township.

Hopewell Township, like many neighboring municipalities, is taking steps to improve the wastewater collection and treatment system through improved operation and maintenance. Accordingly, Hopewell Township has developed Sewer System Rules and Regulations that set forth requirements for connection to the sanitary sewer system and discharge requirements.

1. **A primary focus of Hopewell Township's efforts is the removal of surface water and subsurface water from the wastewater collection system.** The discharge of storm water, surface water, and subsurface water or the connection of downspouts, roof drains, surface drains, areaway drains, foundation drains, interior french drains, stairwell drains, and/or sump pump discharges into a sanitary sewer lateral is absolutely prohibited by our existing legislation. Entrance of this excess flow into our sewer system causes the capacity of the sewer lines, pump stations, and wastewater treatment facilities to be exceeded, thereby causing untreated sewage to

overflow from the system and discharge into nearby streams and waterways, thereby adversely affecting our environment.

2. **Oil and grease are not permitted to be discharged into the sanitary sewer system.** Oil and grease solidifies within the sewer system and can cause sewer system obstructions and the backup of sewage into homes. Oil and grease should be properly disposed of by homeowners and businesses. Commercial establishments that engage in the preparation of food must install appropriate oil and grease separators.
3. **Any alteration or replacement of a sanitary sewer lateral requires the issuance of a Restoration Permit by Hopewell Township.** Hopewell Township has established specifications regarding construction of sanitary sewer laterals. These specifications and Standard Drawings are available on the Hopewell Township web site at www.hopewelltp.com. Any alteration or replacement of a sanitary sewer lateral must be inspected by Hopewell Township.
4. **A Certificate of Compliance is required to be obtained from the Hopewell Township Sewer Department prior to the sale or transfer of improved and sewer real property.** The purpose of a Certificate of Compliance is to verify conformity with Hopewell Township regulations regarding the exclusion of surface water and subsurface water from the sanitary sewer system. Applications are available on the Hopewell Township web site at www.hopewelltp.com. After payment of the required fee, Hopewell Township personnel will conduct a dye test of all roof drains, downspouts, parking area drains, driveway drains, area drains, interior/exterior sumps, and any other potential sources of surface water or subsurface water. If the property passes the dye test, a Certificate of Compliance is issued and is valid for a period of five (5) years from the date of issuance.

StormwaterPA

Hopewell Township has been designated as an MS4 Community by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. MS4 stands for SMALL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEMS. As part of this designation, Hopewell Township is responsible to:

1. **Provide Public Education** regarding the direct connection between the storm sewer system and the Ohio River, Raccoon Creek, and Flaugherty Run.
2. **Solicit Public Participation** to "getting the word out" about the benefits of protecting of the watersheds within Hopewell Township.
3. **Conduct regular inspections** of each storm sewer discharge to identify, report, and correct any inappropriate release of materials into Waters of the Commonwealth.
4. **Reinforce existing procedures to address erosion and sedimentation control** during construction projects.

5. **Reinforce existing ordinances to provide for construction and maintenance** of storm water facilities, such as ponds and basins, that provide post-construction storm water management.

6. **Establish pollution prevention and good housekeeping measures** for municipal vehicles and equipment.

Hopewell Township is completing its inspection and reporting activities for the 2010/2011 reporting period. Residents are reminded that the storm sewer system works wonderfully for both storm water and for any inappropriate item that enters the storm sewer system. Every gum wrapper, pop can, and drop of spilled motor oil that enters the storm sewer system is efficiently delivered to our rivers and streams. Hopewell Township is asking each resident to review their daily activities and to be cognizant of any inappropriate discharges. We should all strive to insure that the source of our drinking water be kept as clean as possible, free of fertilizers, pet wastes, oils, and cleaning chemicals.

 - Metal: Metal food cans, aerosol cans (empty), aluminum foil and foil products (clean), beer and soft drink cans
 - Plastic: Plastic baby wipe containers, bleach, detergent, household cleaner bottles, yogurt cups, cottage cheese, margarine tubs, shampoo bottles
 - Glass: Beverage bottles and food jars (clear, brown, amber and green)
 - Paper: Paperboard boxes (cereal, tissue, shoes, etc.), white office paper, computer paper, magazines, newspapers, advertising inserts, junk mail (including envelopes), catalogs, phone books, paperback books, coupons and receipts, paper bags and shopping bags (handles removed), corrugated, note: corrugated must be tied or bundled and no fin longer than 14" x 14". Recyclables will be picked up every other week on your regular garbage pick-up day. The municipality will be divided into two sections, (a) and (b). Please refer to the street listing (on reverse) to be sure when service will be provided and refer to the calendar below.
- HOLIDAY SERVICE:** If a holiday falls on a Monday through Friday, pickup for the rest of the week will be one day later than the usual day. Observed holidays for 2012. are: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas Day. If the holiday should fall on a weekend, your pick up day will not be affected.
- APPLIANCES CONTAINING REFRIGERANT:** The contractor will collect such items as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, water coolers, etc.: however, the item must have a sticker certifying that the refrigerant has been removed. If it does not have the sticker, it will not be picked up because it is unlawful for the contractor to dispose of these items containing refrigerant. To save refrigerant removal costs, it is suggested that residents have the company delivering the new appliance dispose of the old appliance.

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP CREST

The crest is to serve as a visual representation of the Township. Each quarter of the shield depicts different components that make the township a whole.

The first panel represents the government. The sword represents the police and the protection and execution of the laws they protect. The pen represents the Board of Commissioners and government employees who serve and create the laws. The key is a symbol of the keeping and protection of the laws that govern the Township.

The second panel represents progress and growth, for which the township strives. The crossed shovel and hammer, along with the gear cog and carpenter's square, represent the hard work ethic that Township employees maintain.

The third panel depicts the strong sense of community embodied by residents and neighborhoods. The outline of Hopewell depicts the entirety of the Township's land. The map is wreathed by depictions of the many houses that people call home. The largest public service provided by the Township is the park, which is represented by the trees and trail. Finally, the shaking hands are a symbol of the friendship and helping hands which are never in short supply.



The final panel is representative of education. The lamp on a stack of books symbolizes the quality education provided by our schools and teachers. The three red stars represent past, present and the future of education so that the flame of learning has burned, is burning and will always burn strong.

The other elements incorporated in the crest are the Viking helmet, representative of the school's mascot, the scroll bearing the date of 1812, symbolizing the year of the Township's inception, two Hemlock branches, the official state tree, flanking the shield and the keystone at the bottom represent our membership to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
